1.) DOUBT—Doubt is an emotion with cognitive undertones as opposed to cognition with emotionnal undertones. Reg is in doubt, in part this stems from relative ease with which he completed his BA in Chem EE and his Law degree. He has undertaken autodidact or self-education and education of patent law. Doing so with a combination of primary source literature and video tutorials obtained from the Law scholols at op universitise and presented by highly esteemed provessor in the specialized part of IP law. Reg has found a severe challenge in making some global sense of patent law, and the IP rights confirred by a patent. In this sense of

confusion that led him to begin and continue the writing of a scholarly work on IP and segment of international property law dealing with ethical considerations. It is a circulating about this book that led the RU President to consider the Reg may be an ideal candidate for Provost of the University. What the president and staff didn't realize is that Reg's self doubts has roots in his relationship with Paula. PP Paula like Reg was able to cruze through graduate degrees without confronting any outsized challenges. She however was never concerned with any doubt about her abilities to confront and conquor any challenge, particularly anything related to music. And it was music to which she could always find solitude and satisfaction from even some to the most difficult classical piano pieces by Lizst and other challengig comporsers. Who are the other challenging composers? Because Paula is relatively oblivious to any challenge to herself she is unable to recognize and respond to appreciate the challenges and coubts that other people even including her daughters and certainly including Reg confront nearly every day. PP what are the attributes of doubt: lack of confidence, lack of certainty, indecision ifficulty with categoris and struggling with word choid and even sentence sequence when speaking an writing. Think about the manifistation of doubt and it may lie in the the works of Tillich and Neigbur ... this suggests that the SEP may provide very helpful insights.

- 2.) Golf has been a psssion for Reg when he was in Jr HS. His admiration for an uncle who was hnot only a skilled golfer but someone always fun to play with because his uncle was almost invraiably positive or humaorous with anything that happened on the course. A drive, shot or putt was greated with large and sincere experssions of a job well done. A mis hit shot of his own or anyone else was dismissed with a stroke of humor ... there was no point in lingering or belaboring anything resembling a mistake. Reg realized that almost any phase of the game of golf could be reasonably mastered through decent instruction an practice. For summer money and something to do during summer, Reg was a caddy at a prosperous and prestigious country club within an easy bicycly ride of his home. As a result he received instruction from the club pro as well as a golf scholarship to a private college. Early on in HS he developed an attitude that he could accomplish any academic task ... with similar good advice and practice. Mathematics and chemistry were cases in point. The periodic table quickly made sense to Reg and he almost intutivesly grapsed the incremental nature of calculus through an early introduction to analytic geometry.
- 3.) Paula wsimilar in may ways to REG became adept at the piano and learned the value of practice an an early age. She, however, never experienced the value an good feelings of practice in any of the athletic efforts she either found attractive or found socially necessary to pursue. While her mother was always encouraging with the piano she had no time for athletics nor could she appreciate and justify the time demanded by team play. Accordingly Paula came to see herself as inept and uncoordinated. Paula often felt humiliation when she was not among the girls first selected to form a team in school ...
- 4.) like music, foreigh language, French, came easily for Paula. After three years of study she was accepted for an exchange to France for just a few weeks—enough to highlight her interest in the language and culture and particularly the music of French composers. As an undergrad, Paula majored in Piano and French ...
- 5.) in college Reg tok up running but really hated it ... his motivation came from two acquaintences who where members of the cross country team and recognized the value of running for physical fitness and remaining trim and attractive to the more popular girls on campus.
- 6.) Where and how what year did Reg and Paula meet? Why did they find each other attractive?

- 7.) The time setting for DISCOVERY should probably in the years between 2000 and 2020. pick an index year and work backward and forward for dates of occurance of Events of the novel.
- 8.) Reg was not a highly competitive golfer because early on he knew that golf would not be a lifetime pursuit, and there were other attractions fo rhis life that included chemical engineering and experimental work in the chemistry lab with his mentor Dr. Bradley Beech who though tough as nails regarding anyting in the lab, was curious and endlessly interesting for Reg when the they met almost anyplace outside of the lab. It was this mentor that recognized the significance of the discovery to improve the synthesis of a GlycoProtein molecule being studied. The improved process also involved substantial improvement in the yield of the reaction but did so for reasons that were baffling acertainly to Reg but also to his professor. Nevertheless the process relpresented a breakthrough that could make it eligible for a patens. Professor Beech believed in the potential for patenting the process and consulted with hboth outside attorneys and campus attorneys for advie for possible successful patent process.
- 9.) Professsor Beech said relatively little to Reg across three months prior to summer break and for two full months after the beginning of Reg's senior year. When Dr. Beech made the announcement that Reg would be obligated to present details of the procedure to a group of attorneys and that would be followed by a presentation to a department seminar. This needs to be explored in more detail. Perhaps along some literary consideration of how this has been handled by other authors. What is there that enables esteem but that is or may be able effectively disengage esteem as a prerequisite for self-actualization. Or, are there different attrributes of esteem, some of which or perhaps just one of which may be akey to unlock the acquisition of self-actualization.

Discovery

I am going to move this up on my priority and will reflect this with placement as the first heading in The Stack. That will be permanent after the month of June and completion of Q2 2024. For June on Saturday evening, I will move DISCOVERY to its customary second placement in The Stack. This will greatly facilitate execution of the compilation protocol for Q2.

Step Outline remains a main focus of work on the novel ... nothing else seems to represent a path for progress.

Notes Log

It is high time to take stock of the writing provess and progress for DISCOVERY. There has been precious little progress with advancing the development of the STEP OUTLINE. It may well be that more attention needs to be given to making the LISTS (below) and to fleshing out the EVENTS with very brief annotations, that can then be fleshed out with details.

A strategy for the book may be to listen for around 10-15 ninutes daily and write down one idea that could be developed in some upcoming section, event, character or plot twist during the next 10 days. This writing could be isolated for reference, perhaps as a Google Doc and accessible everywhere. This could also serve an additional function of necessitating the lighting up of the Chromebook once a day. The writing could be any length that seems appropriate for the mement but would likely be around 100-140 words ... but generally without any particular application in mind. May well be worth a try for the Waass book and also for others of the "How to Write ... " genre.

The use of emotion and development of the craft of emotion will be a long term goal and the expectation is that using emotions in small increments it will be possible to develop a skill that in time, will become second nature ... a muscle memory of sorts. There is a huge vocabulary surrounding emotions that will gradually, with more frequent use become an embedded mental mmodel for all writing work. Any good Swede will probably struggle with expressing emotion.

Listening to the audible book *The Emotions Craft of feiction* may actually be a bit too intimidating at theis point in development. Continue listening but don't put too much stock in actually trying to master this "craft" remembering Hemingway and realizing that this a never ending part of development for every writiter of fiction. Remember, you can always return to the book and listen again and again ...

What are *mistakes* the main characters—protagonists and antagonists—make that lead them to DISCOVERY? James Joyce: *Mistakes are the portals of discovery*. Each mistake identified and articulated can represent a knowledge gap, or unanswered question that could become a turning point or element of conflict with a character or between two or more characters. These errors or mistakes could well involve affect as well as cognition or perception.

When might Reg or Paula believe a perception is accurate and useful when it is neither?

A struggle is underway to sort out how best to use these entries from The Stack, in the processes needed to actually write the novel including, Step Outline, Character Summaries, etc. Clearly reading and re-reading (as well as rewriting) of the Step Outline is an essential requisite for progress.

What might be a pretext, subtext or other reason for inclusion of reference(s) to the **Anthropocene**?

The whistle of an ambulance siren ... may relate to the death of a character, at least at a point of discovery.

Make a **Character List** and annotate it as may seem necessary to advance the Step Outline ...

Foster and Event List to keep the Step Outline moving forward ...

Create a **Location List** ... What is the strategic reason of inclusion of the location and how is the located related to other locations. How do characters logically get or go from one location to another as the story progresses?

What can be done with these list in order to make them readily available while constructing the Step Outline, which is *based* on Events ... Not Characters or Locations ... Lists could be converted to PDF and posted on a website for access via Chrome on the Chromebook.

Getting everything from DISCOVERY into a single folder and a series of relevant sub folders will greatly aid progress with this project. So far, the folder DISCOVERY on this drive is the only relevant location, and may well be the best that can be done. However, there is a trove of copy from past efforts with The Stack that can an should be retrived and brought into this folder, perhaps as spin-off documents from the compilations of The Stack dating back a few months. A periodic read-through of this copy should provide a near constant supply of thoughts and ideas about the book and its Step Outline of Events ... there may be a fair amount of repetition, but I don't actually believe it will be too much to stand in the way of progress.



Discovery

Discovery is a story about two people, Reg and Paula, who loved and then lost their way before events colluded (collided) to bring them back to their core values. The novel is set in a mid-western town and its university, where advancement is independent of scholarship. The ticket for entry is the PhD but research of any serious sort is a steep upward slope because too few in the university community

believe research is possible or will be valued.

What are the "core values" shared by Reg and Paula? What are the nuances of these values ant led them to pursue indipendent pathways, and clouded their commitments to dealing with their children and colleagues? Where along the spectrum of narcisissism did each of the fall, and how did these positions contribute to their falling out of favor with each other? What are the *antagonistic forces* at work in each of their lives? Where have aspirations been submerged or camouflaged based on beliefs about the other? How does the failures of dialogue influence their behavioral paths in the story? Where are core values misaligned with aspects of personality, aspirations, fantasy, and their social milieu at RU?

Notes Log

The Step Outline is not to be shared with anyone. However, its content can be described, discussed and delivered via verbal narrative to individuals or small groups that will react and tell the presenter / author about gaps, and delights as they emerge from the narrative. Tell others your story as it emerges from your mind ... Narrative is more than events, but is about relationships among participants in a story ...

Feminism is a factor that is either explicit or is a subtopic or subsomething running through the life of Paula and affecting the lives of he husband, Reg, and their relationships with their children—one of whom was adopted and filled with complexity about her existence / existential being. Accordingly the intersection of existentialism and feminism will require exploration ... who are the existential feminists that may shed important light on this intersection? What are tenets of both ideologies that may intersect as commonalities to be developed through dialogue between two characters. This dialogue may lead Paula to examine or re-examing her feelings and attitudes about feminism ... There may well be justapositioning with Buddhism that could be explored along these lines also.

It may be well to take any of these events and attempt to flesh the event out in terms of an inverted pyramid.

PHOTO STUDIO & DARKROOM ... a tryst that is spontaneous with a photographer, Ryan, Roger, Regina, and Paula. Why is Paula at the photographers studeo? Why did they both go into the darkroom? Studio in an old warehouse building in the downtown sector of the RU city (Name?) ... Was the photographer missing or murdered and why was Paula suspected ... Was the photographer male or female?

LEDE: Today, spontaneous sex occurred, date: in a downtown photo studio ... involving a photographer and another anonomyous actor ...

CHARACTERS: Paula and the photographer (Ruth, Regina (Gene) or Roger?) ... had only met briefly a few days earlier. Is Gene trtansgender(ing)?

ACTION: Sizzling Sex in the darkroom ... foreshadow the attraction ... perhaps a photoshoot with an aspiring vocalist, for who Paula is an accompanist on campus in the musci department of RU ... pre-performance publicity. Photographer asks Paula to pose and hints that the pose could be sans clothing.

Paula had been out running and encountered Ruth near the front entrance of the studio warehouse district building, which was not far from the river (name? Mississippi OK!) where Paula frequently ran in the mornings before work at RU ... What do women typically wear while running? Why was Paula either wearing that or not wearing that on this particular day? Banter at the rehearsal and photoshoot session could have elicited an invitation from Ruth for Paula to visit her studio. The casual meeting while Paula was running could have been a spontaneous follow-up exposing Paula to the depredation of Ruth's insatiable longing for sex

What happens following the sex? Coffee, Tea ... Paula to home and then to work ... Paula's mindset at work ...

Straight-to-Gay Transition ... <u>Huffpost Personal ... I met a worman at pilates</u>.

"Just follow my lead." Passion is universal, if you know intimacy, you will find it in any relationships where you are excited by another or others.
